Drowning	HIGH WATER LEVEL The Lakes are deep and shelve quickly. The bed is not to be considered completely firm outside of the immediate shallows and can be hazardous.	Wading is discouraged, fishing is only allowed from bank or the jetty.	M
Entrapment/suffocation	LOW WATER LEVEL Mud means any area of exposed sediment that cannot be easily assessed as being safe, i.e. it is of an unknown depth or consistency. Wading in such conditions is discouraged. a) Is there suitable safe access? b) Is the bank/material to be stood on or used sufficiently strong to hold the weight? d) Are there trip hazards present? e) consider the duration of the activity and the exposure to the water/mud. f) The safety equipment available e.g. life jackets, throwing lines, first aid kits.	Anglers & guests need to consider the following factors: a) Is there a real need to enter the water or mud? b) Is there a life preserver or throw-line nearby? c) Can assistance be sought from nearby farm staff or other agencies? d) If there is a real need to enter, is it safe to do so, taking account of water flow, temperature, underwater obstructions, depth of the mud? USE OF ROWING BOATS	Anglers should be seated at ALL TIMES as far as is practical, and are asked to use a recognised boat seat or thwart board. Members & guests are reminded that: THEY ARE SOLELY RESPONSIBLE for their own safety and should wear a tested safety aid when on or near the water; and that STANDING TO CAST or FISH FROM A BOAT IS CONSIDERED UNSAFE. Weather	Check the local weather forecast on the day and prepare accordingly. Pay a particular attention to wind direction and strength if boat use is planned. In the event of sudden deterioration row to the nearest bank and get ashore where safe to do so.	Be vigilant for any potential thunderstorms. If in any doubt whatsoever, stop the activity immediately, put your rod down and head to the Lodge for shelter		M
Steep, uneven banks, crossing stiles, fences & ditches	There is a risk of tripping, slipping, or falling	Anglers are advised to take care especially when conditions are wet. SUITABLE FOOTWEAR is required according to conditions as assessed by individual members.	L
